

How to Set Up Zoom

The meetup will be run over Zoom, which is a video conferencing platform that has a hidden feature to turn off all of the mic processing that makes voice sound good and guitars sound bad. It requires a little setup on your part, but there is a walkthrough in the links below.

We'll run the meetup as we normally do. You send in the pieces you'll play, you "show up" at 4pm, and we all play for each other one at a time, in order of the program. The only difference is that you'll have to provide your own snacks.

How to prepare:

- Download the zoom client for your OS https://zoom.us/client/latest/ZoomInstaller.exe

- Read the etiquette guide below, and join us on at the Meetup!

1. Getting Ready

- Make sure you have a clean view of yourself with your guitar on camera

- Also make sure that what's on camera is what you want everyone to see

- Disable notifications or close/disable apps that make sounds to avoid awkward moments while performing or talking

2. Etiquette

- Keep it clean; this group will have people from all age groups and sensibilities

- Keep it positive; this is meant to be an encouraging group

- While someone is performing, mute yourself to avoid unexpected noise

- If you join late, mute yourself as you join to avoid talking over someone's performance

A video conference works best with one person talking at a time. During the periods where we are all engaging with each other, you might have trouble getting a word in. Use the text chat to get everyone's attention, and let someone who is in mid conversation or comment finish their thought by saying, "go ahead" to give them the floor.

3. Wired vs WiFi

If you have the option to connect to a wired connection, DO IT! WiFi is awesome for browsing the Net, but it will struggle in a video conference. You will be uploading your video and downloading the video conference continuously. You want to have the fastest possible connection to make it a successful experience when you play that Bach piece you've been perfecting tirelessly all month.

4. Camera and mic

To get the most out of this meeting, you will need a camera and microphone. Most laptops come with builtin cameras and mics, and that should suffice. However, if you are in the market for something better, take a look at some of the offerings from Logitech. The Logitech C920 does an excellent job with audio and video quality. Do remember, that upgrading your webcam will make you look and sound better to everyone else. It won't make everyone else look and sound better to you. So it is a selfless upgrade.

5. Zoom

Zoom is a great video conferencing app which allows us to host many participants at once and provides high quality video recordings of the video conference. You can download the zoom client for you Mac or PC, or for your mobile device.
